And finally, the fist chess tournament of the year drew to a close with a thrilling final game between Liam T and Casper S finally ending with Casper S being crowned the champion.



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

You can choose from paired specialist modules, such as Plumbing Engineering and Heating Engineering; Heating Engineering and Ventilation Engineering; or Refrigeration Engineering and Air Conditioning.
Or you could opt for standalone specialisms, including Electrotechnical Engineering; Gas Engineering; Protection Systems Engineering; and Electrical and Electronic Equipment Engineering.

Then you'll be able to put everything you learn into practice, with a substantial industry placement of around 45 days. Giving you an amazing opportunity to work with an employer while you study, such as a construction or engineering company, and gain invaluable experience as well as key skills that employers are looking foreage

### WHERE CAN THIS TAKE YOU?

Following a T Level, you could progress straight into a skilled profession or continue your studies with a degree or higher apprenticeship.

Career options might include becoming an Installation Electrician, Maintenance Electrician or Plumbing and Domestic Heating Technician - speak to your careers adviser to find out more

#### KEY INFORMATION

T Levels are an alternative to A levels, apprenticeships and other 16 to 19 courses. Equivalent in size to 3 A levels, a T Level focuses on vocational skills and can help students into skilled employment, higher study or apprenticeships.

Each T Level includes an in-depth industry placement that lasts at least 45 days. Students get valuable experience in the workplace; employers get early sight of the new talent in their industry.

T Level students spend 80% of the course in their learning environment, gaining the skills that employers need. The other 20% is a meaningful industry placement, where they put these skills into action.

### Minister for Skills Jacqui Smith said:

"T Levels are at the forefront of this government's technical education offer. They are excellent qualifications based on employer-led standards and they break down barriers to opportunity, giving young people hands-on experience through industry placements.

"T Levels are also helping to build talented workforces - around a third of T Level students who progress into employment get jobs with their T Level Industry Placement employer.

"I'm delighted to champion T Levels Week as we ensure these qualifications continue to thrive through our Plan for Change. T Levels are growing year on year, with £28 million of additional investment this year for specialist equipment. 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
