

# Nicotine Pouches A Growing Concern Among Young People



Earlier this year, the UK government banned the sale of disposable vapes to help reduce the number of children accessing and using them. However, attention is now turning to another addictive product that is becoming increasingly popular among young people – nicotine pouches, sometimes called snus.

According to Action on Smoking and Health (ASH), awareness of nicotine pouches among 11-18-year-olds has risen significantly. In 2024, 38% of young people in this age group knew what a nicotine pouch was. By June this year, that figure had increased to 43%. Nicotine pouches are small, tobacco-free products placed under the lip, delivering nicotine without smoke or vapor. While marketed as a "safer alternative" to smoking, they still carry risks of addiction and potential harm to health.



# **A-LEVELS**



# ALL YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT A-LEVELS 2025

#### GET INTO A LEVELS

#### Entry requirements for A levels:

To take an A level, you normally need at least:

- 5 GCSEs at grades 9 to 4
- grade 6 in the subjects you want to study

You should check with the school or college where you'd like to study to find out exactly what you'll need.

You'll get a level 3 qualification from each A level you take. You can see what qualification levels mean on GOV.UK.

A levels are also worth <u>UCAS points</u> which you use to apply to university or another type of higher education.

#### After your A levels:

After you've finished your A levels you could:

- apply to university or another type of higher education
- · do a higher level apprenticeship
- find work or join a school leaver scheme

#### **KEY INFORMATION:**

Of all the further education pathways, A levels are the most traditional and academic.

Young people often choose them because they want to go to university (although note that most universities now accept BTECs) and/or they have a clear career goal in mind (eg studying STEM subjects to enter a STEM career).

Their focus on analytical thinking and research skills means they are best suited to motivated and intellectually curious students.

#### Comparing A-levels and GCSEs: Key differences

- You will study fewer subjects than you did at GCSE but, as A-levels are advanced qualifications, your will need to develop a much deeper understanding and knowledge of these subjects
- Because you're picking fewer subjects, A-levels are a good opportunity to start specialising and thinking about potential future careers
- At A-level, you have a lot less input from teachers and are expected to do more independent study
- However, you normally go to more lessons, so you can have more time with your teachers to ask questions and work on projects
- While A-levels are a great entry ticket to university, there
  are some subjects that certain unis won't accept, and
  some they will prefer so do your research!
